Key Terms

A few words appear throughout this book. Here is all you need to know:

Ki – The invisible life energy that flows through all living things. When Ki is strong, you feel alive and clear. When Ki is depleted, life feels heavy and directionless.

Soul (Yeonghon) – The part of you that continues after the body is gone. It carries the imprint of how you lived.

Ancestors – Not figures of the distant past. They are the living roots of your energy, still resonating within you right now.

Cheonsu (Heaven's Hand) – A healing practice that channels the original life energy through the hands, restoring what has been lost.

Haneul 12 JinBeop – A daily practice of twelve movements that realigns your body and mind with the rhythm of Great Nature.

Jeryeong / Yeongsu / Cheondo – Sacred processes for releasing, purifying, and guiding the unresolved energies of those who have passed. Think of them as acts of love directed toward the roots of your life.

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Chapter 1: When Life Ends — A Whisper from Beyond

Most of us have never been taught what happens when we die.

We inherit images — heaven, reincarnation, simple disappearance — but no one has shown us the actual structure of what lies beyond.

The night I heard of Okada-san's passing, I found myself leaning against the wall, fragments of our shared memories circling in my mind.

Okada-san had been a regular visitor to our center in Sakai. Loud, warm, always eating. Never once thinking about death. I had warned him, gently, many times. But the words never reached him. And then, suddenly — he was gone.

That night, a question rose from somewhere deep inside me: What actually happens when a person dies?

The farewell gathering was unusual — more like a lively party than a solemn ceremony. His photograph, smiling as always, was set beside bottles of the wine he loved most, and guests were handed a glass as if to drink with him one last time. The host explained his last wishes: "If I die, don't mourn me — drink wine with me, remember me, and laugh."

Among the crowd, I saw the Master and Mika-chan. Mika's eyes were already glimmering with a question: "Master, what really happens when people die?"

The Master's voice was calm and tender: "The difference between this world and the next is simple: it is whether we can see it or not."

Death as Division, Not Disappearance:

Death is the state where the body (Yin) separates from the spirit (Yang). It is not an end, but a division of the two essences.

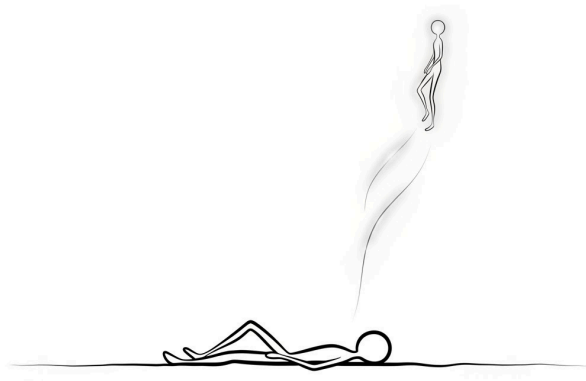
The Law of Frequencies:

The Master's voice broke the heavy silence: "Most exorcisms are only temporary. For true release, you must transform the bond itself."

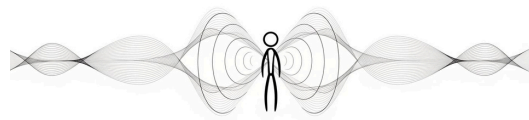
Resonance and Attachment:

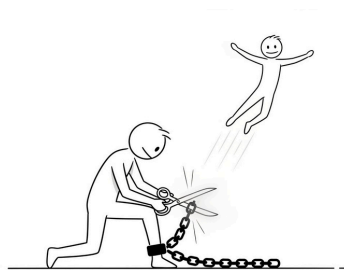
2. Yeongsu: The 21-Day Purification

1. Cheonjon-nim: The Original Source

To know Cheonjon-nim is to recognize the divine spark within your own heartbeat.

Haneul 12 JinBeop: These are more than movements; they are a language of light. By practicing these twelve laws, we realign our frequencies with the rhythm of Great Nature.

3. Living as Children of Heaven
